MESSAGE FROM REV. HACKBARTH

1 But the people of Israel broke faith in regard to the devoted things; for Achan the son of Carmi, son of Zabdi, son of Zerah, of the tribe of Judah, took some of the devoted things; and the anger of the LORD burned against the people of Israel. **Joshua 7: 1 RSV**

After an incredible victory over Jericho, Achan (an Israelite soldier) chooses to disobey a direct order regarding the treasures captured in war. Joshua told his men that all the spoils taken from Jericho are to be considered "devoted things" belonging in God's treasure. Achen defies this order by taking some valuables and hiding them in his family's tent.

As a consequence, Achen, his entire family and belongings (including livestock) were destroyed. By this act, Joshua determined to follow God and to remove anyone who would stand in the way of God's work.



The story of Achen illustrates the principle that leaders may become vulnerable following major successes. Although it is difficult, leaders must take the appropriate steps to remove those who would block God's blessing and work.

When a team member compromises a core value, the ripple effect of his or her action can hurt many others. Godly leaders must stop the trickle effect before it becomes a flood. I do not believe that anyone in any lodge need worry about being "liquidated" by the Exalted Ruler of that Lodge – yet we should thoughtfully consider our interactions with the others in our lodge.

Every action, thought or word has that "trickle down" effect on our Lodge. If we take the time to internalize our core beliefs, we have a greater likelihood of providing positive support to our leadership.

This positive support yields a greater likelihood in accomplishing our goal to make ourselves viable and visible in our community. When people understand that we are "principled" people, we may find ourselves closer to bringing others to the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

On behalf of the veterans hospitalized at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Center in Tomah, it is a sincere pleasure to thank you for the significant donations totaling \$2,998.93.

One-thousand two-hundred fifty dollars of your gift has been deposited to the General Post Fund Resident Account and will be used to help pay for the part-time salary of a resident artist for the Veterans Express Themselves art classes and to purchase art supplies for this program. Ms. Thissen, the resident artist for this program, is working with veterans on all of the buildings and holds an "open studio" in the patient recreation hall for any interested patient - whether an inpatient or an outpatient. The veterans are very enthused about the opportunity to express themselves through art and have created some very nice art murals and individual paintings.

The other \$1,748.93 has been deposited to the General Post Fund Recreation Equipment and Supplies Account and will be used to purchase a trailer and supplies needed for the Elks to build a new Tomah VA float. Voluntary Services has been working with Myron Keding on these purchases and we are all very much looking forward to a new "look" for the VA float!

Please extend our sincere appreciation to all of the members of the Wisconsin Elks Association for their continued dedication and hard work that enables you to give so generously to benefit our hospitalized veterans. *To be considered charitable, the monies generally have to be given to a 501c(3) organization, such as the United Way or the Wisconsin Elks Major Project (the organization can supply you with their IRS determination letter if they truly are a 501c(3)); youth groups such as scouting, boys and girls clubs, youth athletic leagues; not for profit schools; churches, etc. The IRS regulations say that gifts to individuals, no matter how needy, are not charitable unless the name is received from a specific government agency or a 501c(3) organization. (The lodge itself can spend the money, if the names of the people that it services are received from a governmental or 501c(3) organization, and only those people are the ones benefiting.)

*To qualify as educational, the money has to go to the school, in the name of the school and the individual. (This ensures that the monies are spent on tuition and not on personal expenses.)

The list above is not a complete list and there are many types of activities and events that may be eligible but have not been listed, please contact Jeff Langton, Treasurer of the Wisconsin Elks Association, should you have any questions on what programs might be eligible.

(We apologize for the stringent controls in place, but we are holding these funds in trust, and we have to make sure that the funds are spent for the purpose for which they were originally donated.)

I understand that it is solely up to the discretion of the Wisconsin Elks Trustees to determine if a program is eligible for reimbursement. Further, we have not received any reimbursement for these programs from any other source, including other Wisconsin Elks Association committees, nor from our general membership, unless noted above.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS FOR THE 2008 GRAND LODGE SESSION IN ANAHEIM, CALIFORNIA

(1) PROPOSAL TO AMEND SECTION 17.010 OF THE LAWS OF THE ORDER:

The above section reads as follows:

Section 17.010. A proposal or resolution by a Lodge to amend or enact any Law or to amend the Constitution shall be presented to the Grand Lodge, only after the Lodge has furnished satisfactory evidence to the Grand Secretary: (1) that the proposal was submitted in writing and read at a regular meeting of the Lodge and laid over for a vote thereon at a regular Lodge meeting held not less than two (2) weeks nor more than eight (8) weeks thereafter as designated by the Exalted Ruler of the Lodge; (2) that notice in writing setting forth an exact copy of the proposal was sent to the entire membership not less than ten (10) days before the regular meeting at which the proposal was voted upon; and (3) that the proposal was adopted by a two-thirds (2/3rds) vote of the Members present at the regular meeting, certified by the Exalted Ruler and Secretary setting forth the number of Members present at the meeting and the number in favor and the number voting in opposition. The adopted proposal shall be filed in duplicate with the Grand Exalted Ruler and Grand Secretary not later than April 1st preceding the Grand Lodge Session. A copy of every proposal or resolution, timely and properly submitted, to amend or enact any Law or amend the Constitution with is presented to the Grand Secretary pursuant to this Section shall be submitted to all Subordinate Lodges by the Grand Secretary at least sixty (60) days prior to the convening of the next Grand Lodge Session. The provisions of this Section shall not apply to proposals or actions by State Associations permitted in Section 17.020 nor to any proposals submitted by the Grand Lodge Committee on Judiciary.

The proposed amendment would read as follows:

Section 17.010. The Grand Secretary upon receipt of a resolution to amend the Constitution and/or By-Laws of the Order from Subordinate Lodges shall forward copies of said Thirty (30) days prior to the Grand Lodge Session to which it is to be presented. Only those resolutions so proposed and forwarded to Subordinate Lodges shall be considered for a vote at the Grand Lodge Session. After being adopted at the Grand Lodge Session the adopted proposal shall be filed in duplicate with the Grand Exalted Ruler and Grand Secretary not later than April 1st preceding the Grand Lodge Session. A copy of every proposal or resolution, timely and properly submitted, to amend or enact any Law or amend the Constitution with is presented to the Grand Secretary pursuant to this Section shall be submitted to all Subordinate Lodges by the Grand Secretary at least sixty (60) days prior to the convening of the next Grand Lodge Session. The provisions of this Section shall «et apply to proposals or actions by State Associations permitted in Section 17.020 and «ef to any proposals submitted by the Grand Lodge Committee on Judiciary.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS FOR THE 2008 GRAND LODGE SESSION IN ANAHEIM, CALIIFORNIA (CONTINUED)

(2) PROPOSAL TO AMEND SECTION 17.020 TO THE LAWS OF THE ORDER:

The above section reads as follows:

Section 17.020. A State Association has the right to propose a Law or an Amendment to a Law. The proposal shall be sent to the Grand Secretary and the Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary at least fifteen (15) days before the annual Grand Lodge Session. The Committee on Judiciary shall present the proposal to the Grand Lodge with its recommendation.

The proposed amendment would read as follows:

Section 17.020. A State Association has the right to propose a Law or an Amendment to a Law. The proposal shall be sent to the Grand Secretary and the Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary by May 15th preceding the Grand Lodge Session to which it to be proposed. The Grand Secretary upon receipt of a resolution to amend the Grand Lodge Statutes from State Associations shall forward copies of said resolution to amend the Constitution and/or By-Laws of the Order to all Subordinate Lodges at least Thirty (30) days prior to the Grand Lodge Session to which it is to be presented. Only those resolutions so proposed and forwarded to Subordinate Lodges shall be considered for a vote at the Grand Lodge Session, at least fifteen (15) days before the annual Grand Lodge Session. The Committee on Judiciary shall present the proposal to the Grand Lodge with its recommendation.

This Resolution is proposed by the Massapequa, New York Elks Lodge No. 2162.

(3) PROPOSAL TO ADD SECTION 14.015 TO THE LAWS OF THE ORDER:

The proposed new section would read as follows:

Section 14.015. A member in good standing who relocates from his home Lodge jurisdiction to another jurisdiction may petition another lodge in the area of his new residence for dual membership. His petition for same must be processed in an identical manner to that of all petitioners for membership. If elected to dual membership, the Member shall pay all dues required by his home lodge and his dual lodge. Suspension for non-payment of dues in the Member's home lodge will automatically suspend him from membership in his dual lodge. A Member may drop his membership in his dual lodge and retain his membership in his home lodge, provided he pays all dues to the latter each year. A Dual Member who is a Past Exalted Ruler will be entitled to vote in Grand Lodge only once and must register at the session under one lodge only.

A member who takes dual membership shall pay all dues required by both his Home Lodge and his Dual Lodge and shall have all the rights and privileges of membership in both the Lodges, except as noted regarding notice in the Grand Lodge.

Suspension or expulsion of a multiple member by either his Home Lodge or his Dual Lodge shall immediately suspend or expel his membership in both lodges. The Secretary of the Lodge suspending or expelling such member shall immediately notify the Grand Secretary and also any other Lodge in which the member holds membership. Restoration from suspension in one lodge shall automatically restore his membership in the other.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS FOR THE 2008 GRAND LODGE SESSION IN ANAHEIM, CALIFORNIA (CONTINUED)

A Dual Member may withdraw his membership in his Dual Lodge upon giving written notification of his intention to do so at a regular meeting of the Dual Lodge. However, termination of his membership through absolute dimit from or suspension for non-payment of dues in his Home Lodge will automatically terminate his dual membership in the other lodge.

This Resolution is proposed by Monterey, California Elks Lodge No. 1285.

(4) PROPOSAL TO AMEND SECTION 14.010 OF THE LAWS OF THE ORDER:

The above section in relevant part reads as follows:

Section 14.010. ..."A Member of the Order cannot be a Member of more than one Lodge at the same time".

The proposed amendment would read as follows:

Section 14.010. ..."A Member of the Order cannot be a Member of more than one Lodge at the same time, except as provided for in Section 14.015".

Every faith has its fools who twist the meaning and intent of the words of God to their own evil design. They will fail.

In this, we will not be alone. Around the world, as we assemble, in every mosque and church and temple, people of good will bend their knees and raise their faces to God in silent supplication for His infinite mercy, continuing grace and divine justice. He has never abandoned us. He never will.

We must never forget the words of perhaps our most illustrious founding father, Benjamin Franklin who warned that those who would give up some degree of their liberty for some degree of security deserve neither liberty nor security.

As Americans and Elks, we work to improve the lives of all people of good will. We befriend the friendless. We protect the unprotected. We cherish the memory of our dead.

Our good deeds are our monuments, our compassion and forgiveness – our legacy; our accomplishments are our Honor roll.

And so, we remember our fallen in both word and deed.
