11	We have a total of 258 Elks attending
12	this convention. A total of 214 voting credentials
13	were issued. You will be voting on the ivory
14	ballots. Do not tear your stubs from your
15	credentials. We will have people positioned in the
16	four corners and in the middle aisle where you will
17	turn in your ballots and your credentials. They will
18	remove the stub that's needed.
19	All of the voting information will be
20	given to you by Bill Forrest.
21	That's all I have.
22	MR. RADIG: Thank you, Jan.
23	We will now go directly into the
24	election process.
25	The Chair now recognizes Past State

1	President Bill Forrest, Parliamentarian, to explain
2	the nomination election pro procedure.
3	MR. FORREST: Hey Todd, pay
4	attention.
5	All right. I guess not.
6	Bill Forrest, Past State President,
7	State Parliamentarian, Wausau Lodge No. 248.
8	The bylaws of the Wisconsin Elks
9	Association provide for the election of officers at
10	this convention. Regarding the offices, all Elks in
11	good standing in this association are eligible to
12	hold office with the exception of the offices of
13	President and President-Elect. These offices can
14	only be held by a Past Exalted Ruler.
15	Nominations will be made from the floor
16	for all elective offices.
17	With respect to the office of
18	Vice-President, they are nominated and elected only
19	from their corresponding Grand Lodge district. You
20	vote only for the candidates nominated within your
21	district.
22	Trustees are selected, one Trustee from
23	each Grand Lodge district. So all people all
24	registered voter credentials are eligible to vote for
25	a Trustee position.

1	This year, we'll also have nomination
2	for Secretary. It is a two-year term, and it
3	alternates back and forth each year between Treasurer
4	and Secretary.
5	Make sure you submit a clear ballot.
6	If you do not submit a clean ballot, the Elections &
7	Credentials committee is going to have to declare the
8	ballot invalid.
9	At the conclusion of my instructions,
LO	the President will call upon Jan Schultz, chair of
.1	the committee on Credentials & Elections, to
L <b>2</b>	supervise and conduct the election and collect and
L3	count the ballots.
L <b>4</b>	As we've done in the past, the
L5	committee will have members stationed around the
L6	room. When you have completed your ballot, please
L <b>7</b>	proceed to the nearest member of the committee and
L8	present your ballot along with your credential. And
L9	that's the same instruction that Jan presented. So
20	make sure that you follow the instructions
21	explicitly.
22	After the ballots have been collected,
23	the regular business of the convention will proceed
24	until the committee is ready to report the results of
25	the election.

1	Upon completing the nominations where
2	there is one candidate for any office, the President
3	will direct the casting of a unanimous ballot for
4	such candidate.
5	Upon completion of the count, the
6	committee shall report the results of the election by
7	reporting the numbers of votes cast for each
8	candidate for office.
9	Finally, I propose some loose some
10	loose rules for the nominations. Because there is
11	apparently only one contested office, ladies and
12	gentlemen, feel free to to be short in your
13	nominations and seconding speeches.
14	For President-Elect, one nominating
15	speech of not more than three minutes will be
16	accepted and two seconding speeches of no more than
17	one minute each.
18	For Trustees and Vice-Presidents, one
19	nominating speech of no more than one minute and one
20	seconding speech of no more than one minute.
21	In the case of the Secretary, I
22	probably could declare that no nomination is
23	necessary.
24	In all in all cases, remember that
25	seconding speeches are optional.

2	directly with the Attorney General from Wisconsin.
3	And he gave a very good presentation to the group.
4	And there's two needs of with the kids and
5	different things that the State is trying to do in
6	conjunction with athletics as well as with the th
7	Drug Awareness program and that. And they certainly
8	recognize that it's an important thing to get across
9	to our kids. So it's a good collaboration there.
10	I note I'm not sure where Dale is
11	at. But Dale wants to really tell everybody that we
12	need to get those Drug Awareness trailers out in our
13	communities. We have one in Portage, Waukesha, and
14	Wausau. And I think, currently, we only have two
15	trailers booked for the whole summer. So you're
16	doing yourselves a disservice by not trying to book
17	those trailers. You do need to contact Dale, though
18	in order to get those trailers.
19	We talked about how to get the
20	different materials through the Grand Lodge as well
21	as through myself: Pencils, erasers, rulers.
22	We had Stacey Schroeder, who is the
23	Enrique Camarena, our state award winner.
24	She got a plaque from Grand Lodge, which just
25	arrived, like, the day before our session.

1	And also for Secretaries, you need to
2	meet with the Drug Awareness people to be able to
3	record that in those charity reports because, as I
4	look through the charity report, there was only five
5	lodges that did something with Drug Awareness across
6	the state of Wisconsin. And I know that's not
7	happening. So we need to coordinate the Drug
8	Awareness chairman with the Secretary because there's
9	a special section there that's reported for Drug
10	Awareness. And that is how Grand Lodge they look
11	at it, and they think, well, maybe Drug Awareness
12	isn't as important as what we thought. So we really
13	need to record that properly there.
14	So the rest of my report will be on
15	file electronically.
16	And with your pleasure, could I also
17	give a grant report?
18	MR. RADIG: Yes, please.
19	MR. BRIEN: Thank you.
20	As the grant coordinator just recently
21	appointed and that, I went through the statistics.
22	And our lodges lost \$24,000 \$24,500 because you
23	did not get your gratitude grants. That wasn't
24	we I think that accounted for about 12 lodges.
25	And that's kind of pretty alarming because this is

1	money that you can be putting into your communities
2	that we aren't doing. And it's not just putting the
3	money in there, but it's the exposure that we get
4	from the results of doing those different things in
5	your community.
6	Also, as a sublight on that is that if
7	you wait until the last minute to turn in all your
8	ENF funds, again, you're doing a disservice to your
9	community because you don't get that money until the
LO	very end. And if it goes past the deadline, you
L1	might have lost it completely. So make sure you're
L2	getting that goal to to get that ENF in.
L3	On a happy note, every lodge in the
L <b>4</b>	country is going to be getting is eligible for
L5	what's called an anniversary grant. It's a grant for
L6	\$1,500. It's a one-time grant. And this grant is
L <b>7</b>	going to be handled much like the gratitude grant.
L8	You don't have to meet a plateau. The money is there
L9	for your community. You have to go out, though, and
20	apply for it. So now is the time to start looking
21	for those different grant opportunities for you.
22	Promise grant. I'm going to tell you
23	right now, start planning for that. It's a
24	youth-orientated grant. There's, like, 500 that are
25	offered out there. Start your planning now - excuse

1	me - because on July 1st is when that's going to ope
2	up. And the sooner you get in on that promise grant
3	the better the chances are that you're going to get
4	that grant as long as it's acceptable through Grand
5	Lodge.
6	So that's my report. Thank you.
7	MR. RADIG: Thank you, Jerry.
