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— COVERAGES NOT INCLUDED —

Since the Program deals solely with Liability Insurance, there are a number of exposures that a Lodge or State Association must evaluate and insure separately. Among them:

Fire, Extended Coverage and other perils on real and personal property.1

Damage to Boiler, Pressure Vessels, Air-Conditioning Systems and other Mechanical / Electrical Equipment.1

Directors & Officers Liability (D&O). (This type of coverage refers primarily to misjudgment in Lodge management or possibly to discriminatory practices.)2

Insurance on **Owned Vehicles**. No coverage is provided for any person for uninsured or under-insured motorists. This coverage has been excluded and rejected for vehicles of any type.

Owned Watercraft over 18 feet in length or any watercraft propelled by sail, engine power or electrical power regardless of length.

Non-Owned Watercraft over 52 feet in length.

Owned Aircraft.

Pollution Liability. This may be important to Lodges that have a potential for discharging any waste products into the environment that utilize large amounts of chemicals, such as insecticides, in their operations or have underground fuel storage tanks. No coverage is provided for exposure to asbestos, lead or mold. (Limited coverage is provided for golf courses under some circumstances.)

Accident, health, life or disability or any employee benefit coverage.

Employee Dishonesty (including required bonds on Lodge Officers).1

Robbery and Burglary.1

Surety Bonds of any kind, including those required by federal, state or local governmental bodies.

Workers' Compensation.

Liability for tenants or independent contractors.

Insurance on personal autos, residences or other property of officers and members even if they are used occasionally for Lodge or Association business.

Claims arising from the Business risk of operations that do not involve bodily injury or property damage.

Breach of contract claims that do not involve bodily injury or property damage.

- 1 Local Lodges must participate in the Elks Property Plus Program per Section 4.232 of the Statutes of the Order.

PARKING LOTS

A large number of claims are made by persons using Lodge parking lots. The Lodge's accident prevention manager should frequently inspect the parking lots with the following situations in mind:

- 1. Physical Condition: Is the parking area free from holes, broken pavement or other hazards. If there are problems with any surface conditions, they should be repaired immediately. When this is not possible, such areas should be marked and excluded from use.
- 2. Lighting: All areas used for parking should be properly lighted during night hours or when visibility is limited. Areas with inadequate lighting should not be used for parking and such areas should be properly blocked from use.
- 3. Removal of Ice and Snow: Plans should be made to promptly remove ice and snow from any areas used for parking. This may require special planning, but it is imperative that such planning be done. The removal process must be done in a proper manner so that hazards are not increased. If an outside contractor is used to remove ice and snow, it is preferable that a contract be obtained from the contractor that holds the Lodge harmless for the contractor's negligence or failure to perform the work required by the contract. Also make sure that this contractor has proper insurance. Records should be maintained to indicate time of removal and salting or other treatment.
- 4. Parking Stops/Speed Bumps: If parking lots have raised parking stops or speed bumps, it is essential that such stops are in good repair and properly illuminated by paint and appropriate lighting. If not required by law, it is suggested that all such installations be removed.
- 5. Construction: If construction work is being done on the Lodge or parking lot, make sure that any disrupted areas that might create a slip-and-fall hazard are clearly marked and properly illuminated. If contractors are doing the work, make sure they hold the Lodge harmless and have proper insurance.
- 6. Post a sign that states: "Not responsible for damaged or stolen cars or theft from cars. Everyone parks at their own risk."
- 7. If a Lodge has parking for RVs or trailers, make users sign an agreement that the Lodge will not be responsible for damage to the parked unit and that the owner will indemnify and hold the Lodge harmless from any liability claims arising out of parking the unit. If owners won't sign this agreement, do not let them park.

III. ACCIDENT PREVENTION

PUBLIC SAFETY IS A PRIME CONSIDERATION

Your Lodge gains the respect of the entire community by exhibiting a high regard for public safety (an ongoing focus on safety will allow such respect to grow). In service to this objective, it is absolutely necessary for each Lodge to strictly enforce the policy that an individual approaching intoxication is not to be served an alcoholic beverage. [See Section VIII, pages 26-28]

Using the Self-Inspection Checklist should help identify and reduce safety hazards:

- 1. LOOSE or BROKEN roof tiles, walking surfaces, planter edges, etc., should be replaced or repaired as soon as damage is discovered.
- Include any WASTE DISPOSAL AREAS in the parking lot cleaning duties. Make certain this area is kept clean to prevent insect and rodent infestation.
- 3. The **DINING and MEETING AREAS** demand constant cleaning. When these areas are in use, spills should be swept up with a broom and "dry mopped." All chairs, stools and tables should be inspected periodically for safety.
- 4. If MATS are used in doorways, care should be taken that the edges do not curl (hard rubber mats with bound metal edges are better than woven fiber mats).
- 5. Only commercial-grade CHAIRS, STOOLS, TABLES and BENCHES should be used and must be inspected monthly. Those found to be BROKEN, CRACKED, or DAMAGED should be removed from use until they can be repaired or replaced. A record of the date of purchase or receipt of such items should be maintained and the name of the manufacturer retained.

If an injury occurs related to such equipment, remove the item from service but retain it for viewing by claims adjustors.

- 6. HIGH-CHAIRS and BOOSTER SEATS should be stored away from high-traffic areas and removed from use if damaged.
- 7. STAIR AND FLOOR coverings should be a taut, nonslip type and not too soft or heavily padded. A defined contrast in colors between floor surfaces, such as from carpet to linoleum, calls attention to tripping/stumbling hazards. Any difference in elevation requiring a step up or down should be clearly marked and lighted. Make sure there is adequate lighting on ramps and stairs.
- 8. Installed HANDRAILS and RAILINGS in good repair are a requirement on stairs, ramps and mezzanines; mid-rails and toe-boards prevent children and stock from falling through.
- 9. Safety glass DOORS marked with Elks emblems/decals at eye level will prevent painful and sometimes serious physical injury. Lodges can further prevent persons from colliding with glass doors by posting "in" and "out" signs.
- 10. EXITS should be visibly marked, lighted, unlocked and operational during business hours.

11. PARKING LOTS have been sites of numerous accidents; a well-lit lot with no cracks or pot holes is basic. Snow and ice should be removed to prevent slips and falls. Parking bumpers, dividers and islands will be visible if they are painted in contrasting colors. A hazard-free parking area requires regular inspections and quick, corrective action when problems are found.

- 12. All WALKWAYS should be clearly marked. As with parking lots, snow and ice must be removed. Frequent inspection is necessary.
- 13. OUTDOOR FIXTURES and PLAYGROUNDS need to be free of defects that can cause injuries. In addition to the quarterly Self-Inspection, the area should be visually checked on a weekly basis.
- 14. SWIMMING POOLS can be the sites of deadly accidents. Pay constant attention to the pool area; the activity in and about the pool; and the Self-Inspection items. This area should be visually checked constantly when in use. Make sure that proper life-saving devices are present. Don't allow horseplay. It is strongly suggested that diving boards be removed from all pools. It is also strongly recommended that all pools have trained lifeguards on duty when open.
- 15. RESTROOMS and LOCKER ROOMS are the sites of many accidents. They need to be checked constantly for wet floors and other slip-and-fall hazards. Lighting levels and items found in the Self-Inspection Checklist should also be checked.
- 16. DANCE FLOORS can generate many accidents:
 - > Under no circumstances should unauthorized persons be allowed to put any substances on dance floors.
 - ➤ Elevation changes such as ramps, floors and stairs—as well as any changes in floor coverings—can cause trips and falls. Contrasting color or lighting should be used to highlight elevations and floor covering changes.
 - > Chairs and tables should be properly placed, so they are not too close to the dance floor.
 - > Any and all spills should be cleaned up immediately.
 - > Extension cords should be taped down or properly secured to prevent trips and falls.
 - Waxed surfaces should be monitored for safety; only non-slip wax should be used.
 - > Monitor the condition of portable dance floors and make repairs as necessary.

IV. SAFETY

The safety of members, guests and employees is important; establish a basic set of rules for everyone to follow. Members, guests and employees will only consider safety to be of prime importance if you demonstrate commitment first.

The Accident Prevention Manager should identify hazards and ensure that preventive safeguards and adequate personal protection are provided.

Advisory Committee Minutes Wisconsin Elks Association Annual Convention Paper Valley Hotel, Appleton May 3, 2019

Past Presidents Present: Laflin, Slavik, Forrest, Meyer, DeRosier, Behnke, Bertrand, Daley, Widzinski, Bruckner, Bohnsack, Nitze, R. Shannon, Kostuck, Voulgaris, Radig and Myers. Sears, Palm, Hermann, Simmons, Bennett, Swantz, Hubbartt and Assmann were excused. Also present were President Demmin, President-Elect N. Shannon, Secretary Johnson, Treasurer Langton and Trustees Olander and Franklin. Guest present was State Sponsor Lou Sulsberger, Past Grand Exalted Ruler, Flora IL Lodge No. 1659.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Voulgaris at 1:30 pm. at the Red Lion Paper Valley Hotel and Conference Center, Appleton. PSP Bruckner gave the Invocation. Chairman Voulgaris led the Pledge of Allegiance.

A moment of silence was held in remembrance of Past First Lady Nancy Laflin.

There being no additions or corrections, it was moved by Widzinski, seconded by Bruckner to approve the minutes of the February 1, 2019 as distributed. Motion carried.

Committee Treasurer Kostuck reported there was a beginning balance of \$2,050.14. There were revenues received with \$20.00 in dues, and \$220.00 for the sale of State ties. He reported expense of \$50.00 to the Elks National Foundation in memory of Nancy Laflin. There is a final balance of 2,240.14. There being no additions or corrections, it was moved for approval by Bertrand, seconded by Meyer. Motion Carried.

Chair DeRosier reported that the Board of Directors met in the morning to review and approve the proposed 2019-2020 Association Administrative and Charitable budgets. They will be presented for approval to the membership at the Saturday afternoon General Session.

State Secretary Johnson reported a loss in membership in Wisconsin of 92 members. He expressed his appreciation for the cooperation by the staff of the Paper Valley, however he noted that attendance at Conferences and Conventions continues to decline. This is of concern as it affects compensation to the Association from the hotel. He said that the reduced rates for the meals has increased participation at the Luncheon and Banquet. He reported preparation of the Bugle and Directory were going well. President-elect Shannon has done a nice job of putting together her committee recommendations. He noted the Fall Conference will once again occur on a Packer home game weekend, so attendees should make sure they secure their hotel reservations as soon as possible. However, reservations will not be accepted at the front desk during the weekend. He reported the Midwinter Conference will be held at the Radisson Hotel in Green Bay beginning in 2021 with the site secured through 2026. The Conference is also being moved from the first weekend to the third weekend in February. The Convention and Fall Conferences will remain in Appleton, with the venue secured through 2027.

The State Treasurer Langton reported on the final 2018-2019 Financial statement, noting all bills are current. For the Administrative report there were receipts of \$55,799.62 and expenses of \$52,222.76. A balance of \$2,700.22 is in checking. The Association has \$3,924.78 in a regular money market index account, and \$240,662.00 invested through Raymond James Securities. The Charitable report has receipts of \$340,573.35 and expenses of \$326,866.35. There is

\$8,987.65 in the checking account. There is \$5,671.98 in the Charitable Money Market Index Account. In restricted accounts are the Bruckner/Bohnsack Fund and the Pat Nitze Account with \$14,484.16 and \$14,332.98, respectively. The Association tax return for 2018 has been filed.

President Demmin made his final comments to the Committee expressing how fast the year has gone. He stated he and First Lady Jeannie enjoyed the hospitality and meeting all the great Wisconsin Elks at their 29 visitations. He expressed his gratitude for the support and encouragement of the Past State Presidents during the year. It has been an honor to represent the Wisconsin Elk Association this past year. He wished President-Elect Nikki and Ron Shannon the best for their upcoming year.

President-elect Shannon gave her report noting that her recommendations for committee appointments are complete and have been forwarded to the State Secretary for publication of the Directory. She will be attending the Exalted Rulers/Leading Knight Committee meeting on Saturday with the message that she is responsible for the committee appointments. If there are issues with her committee selections they should deal with her directly, not with Secretary Johnson. She said it was awesome traveling with Sam and Jeannie.

Under Old Business, Sponsor Franklin reported that the Northwest District Esquire to the District Deputy is Tom Woller, Stevens Point Lodge No. 641. Bertrand reported that South District Esquire is Ben Godlewski, Waukesha Lodge No. 400.

District sponsors gave reports on the status of each of their respective districts, as follows: South – Bertrand; Central – Widzinski; Northeast – Forrest; Northwest – Franklin. Franklin reported the Northwest District is doing generally well, noting that Ashland is now stable. Rice Lake continues to deal with financial issues related to club operations. Bertrand reported that the Platteville Lodge has digressed and is fearful the Lodge cannot survive. Widzinski said the Central District was stable, but membership loss continues a concern. He asked Meyer to comment on the Baraboo Lodge, who said they are doing super since it eliminated its lease in the former building. Therefore, he is recommending they be taken off probation. Forrest noted there continue to be problems with the midnight Trustees at Wausau. All Lodges have full slates of officers, and the Lodges are making appropriate use of all grants available from the Association and Grand Lodge.

In further Old Business, Bohnsack reminded the members that he will be stepping down from responsibilities of the Major Project Booth. He said there needs to be two or more people to handle set up and take down of the booth. He will continue to help, but needs someone to step up. The Booth is impressive, and is annually a Five Star award winner at Grand Lodge. He has a new Major Project pin for this year which are available for "one for \$3, two for \$5 or three for \$10"

Election of Officers-

- Chairman: Radig was nominated by Forrest. There being no further nominations they were closed.
- Vice Chairman: Myers was nominated by Forrest. There being no further nominations they were closed.

- Secretary: Forrest was nominated by Daley. There being no further nominations they were closed.
- Treasurer: Kostuck was nominated by Laflin. There being no further nominations they were closed.

It was moved by Bohnsack, seconded by Bruckner to cast a unanimous ballot for the 2019-2020 nominated officers. Motion carried.

Widzinski presented a written proposal for revising the Memorial Service. In summary, the Service would be modified to recognize Past First Ladies. He said the main purpose of the Service is to recognize members of each Lodge who have died during the last year. Past Presidents are eulogized in recognition of their contributions to the Association. This service will add recognition for Nancy Laflin as Past First Lady. A candle will be lit by the immediate Past First Lady, in this case by Muriel Myers. In the future, the immediate Past First Lady will always be called upon to lite any candle for any deceased First Lady. Upon presentation of the proposal to modify the service, it was moved by DeRosier, seconded by Shannon to adopt the proposed Protocol for the Memorial Service. Motion Carried Unanimously. With these revisions in place, Widzinski noted the Memorial Service will be held on Saturday afternoon, with the "team" being ready to go.

Special Deputy Daley noted that there are still five Lodges that have Special Representatives. He thanked the District Sponsors and District Deputies for their continuing cooperation. He said that Grand Lodge now recognizes Sponsors as "District Leaders."

Grand Lodge Committeeman Bruckner, Grand Lodge Government Relations Committee, reported the Committee is working to ensure that all hours and donations for charitable and civic activities are fully reported, noting that Marinette and Beloit Lodge reports were filed late. The Committee continues to work on the increase for unrelated income.

Bruckner reported the Benevolent Fund Board met in the morning and reported the fund stands at \$2.133 Million. The Fund's financial advisor appeared before the Committee via Skype. He plans to attend each Convention session when the Budget is being considered for the coming year. Otherwise he will appear via Skype. Bruckner said the Fund approved an increased to the State Association from \$100,000 to \$110,000 for the 2020-21 fiscal year. He stressed the fund is now structured to set aside one to two years of operations.

In his comments, State Sponsor Sulsberger congratulated the Committee for the commitment to recognize a Past First Lady as part of the Memorial Service. It recognizes the great works that wives do for the President, and for their contributions to our Association. He noted the PSP Myers is replacing Franklin as Northwest District Leader. He reflected on his experience recently as he was impressed with the maturity of the youth scholars and hoop shoot participants he met recently in Chicago. He said they represented the Elks well.

In his final comments, Voulgaris expressed that is was an honor for the opportunity to serve as Chair. He expressed his desire that the Past State President's continue to support all officers and

Lodges so they remain active, vibrant and growing. He announced that the next meeting will be at 1:30 pm on Friday, September 13, 2019 at the Paper Valley Hotel in Appleton.

President Elect Shannon invited everyone to the Neenah-Menasha Lodge for lunch after installation on Sunday.

PSP Laflin thanked the PSPs for attending the funeral for Nancy. He, his family and friends were impressed with them all gathering and entering the parlor in their red coats, and for the respect and affection extended by them.

PSP Shannon paid a fine of \$20.00 for his phone going off during the meeting, and for not being dressed in proper attire.

In conclusion, a round of applause was extended to President Demmin for his service as President to the Association.

There being no further business, the meeting was dismissed in prayer by PSP Bruckner at 2:50 pm.

Wausau

Wausau is trying to move on from a cancer that cost them many members and lots of income. The current officer are looking towards the future and our setting dates for projects to help grow membership and bring back the comradery the lodge once had. Although one or two of the midnight trustees are still spreading the poison most of them are now trying to work for the betterment of the lodge. Events such as trivia is now bringing in as many as 90 people on a Wed night.

All officers and Trustees have been installed, and Lodge and House Committee Rosters have been completed. I believe that we have a very competent and cohesive BOD for this Lodge year, and I have complete confidence that they will always act in the best interest of the Lodge, and work diligently to overcome our challenges.

Our Lodge and House committees have been given their first directives, which are largely prioritizing the needs of the Lodge in regards to each committee, formulating a cohesive and achievable plan to meet these needs, and beginning to create SOP's and handbooks for future years' committees to be able to use as a guide.

The finance committee met, with most other officers and trustees also present to provide additional insight and to gain a better understanding of our true financial situation. Fiscally, our lodge is currently very soft. The Club has continually lost money for decades, and this has been compounded by necessary repairs on our aging building and decreasing revenue, particularly due to the divisive nature of last year's events. The budget we created was realistic when compared to past years, but was very conservative with regard to anticipated revenue. The presented budget showed a total loss for the year of nearly \$40K total between the Lodge and the Club, with the restaurant being the largest fiscal drain, as has been the case for over 30 years. However, the BOD is aggressively pursuing more revenue through increased membership participation, new events, increased ballroom rentals, and outside grants, and I am confident that we will end the year far ahead of budget.

The first few weeks of this Lodge Year have been very promising in regards to participation and revenue. We currently already have more weddings and events booked in the ballroom than we did all of last year. Our Easter Brunch had over 300 reservations; well above last year. Team Trivia has had two back to back record breaking attendances, with 80 participants and 84 participants (in addition to the bar crowd) the past two sessions, respectively. Additionally, our Banquet and Events Coordinator, Amanda, has been very proactive in promoting Lodge events on Facebook, and the results have been overwhelmingly positive. In fact, for the week of April 14-20, Lodge posts reached over 1630 people,

which is about 2 ½ times the number of people that our newsletter alone reaches.

We are scheduled to begin our Capital Improvements project soon. The project was made possible with nearly \$60K in grants from several local foundations, and will involve the tuckpointing and repairing of our entire building's exterior. We are also having the front awning of our Lodge replaced. Once completed, our Lodge will look the best that it has since it was built in 1923.

I submitted the letter of intent for the Impact Grant this year to work jointly with JoJo's Jungle in the construction of a playground and learning center that is accessible to children with disabilities. This would be a very high-profile project in our community, and would be meeting a very real need. Our Lodge has not pursued this grant since 2016, and we are excited and optimistic for this opportunity.

The divisiveness that plagued our Lodge for the past year seems to be diminishing, but is still present, and is still being perpetuated by a small minority of individuals. I am addressing this as necessary, and have instructed the rest of the officers to do so as well. I will continue to keep you informed of any developing situations in regards to this.

All in all, I think that our Lodge Year is off to a strong start. I look forward to this coming year, and am confident that we will be successful in moving the Lodge forward.
