8	said, as a federal agent, he is sworn to duty to
9	enforce all drug laws. And one of them being is
10	that, as a drug enforcement agency, marijuana is
11	considered on a federal level as an illicit drug, and
12	there is a conflict politically between states that
13	exist there. And I thought that was kind of
14	interesting because, you know, states are are
15	voting and including the state of Wisconsin is
16	looking at that in the future that, why is that
17	happening? So he didn't have a good answer for that,
18	but it does exist.
19	We have as you are well aware of, we
20	did sell the trailers, thanks to Ken Johnson, through
21	a bidding process. And all four of them were sold
22	through a bid.
23	We have materials that are going to be
24	available to the lodges. And we're going to try to
25	simplify trying to get them to the lodges.

1	We had a poster contest, and the prizes
2	will be awarded. We have four of the lodges that
3	received money coming back. We've asked that those
4	lodges issue checks to the students on their lodge
5	checks, and then they will be reimbursed through the
6	state so because, otherwise, it's too confusing to
7	try to hunt down students over the summertime.

20	hearing, I have 55 rooms reserved for St. Louis.
1	As of this morning, Nikki, we have 50
2	of those rooms reserved.
3	So I have five rooms left. If you
4	haven't gotten your RSVP, please get it to me very
5	soon. Our cutoff day is May 27th. If you can get

1	them to me a little bit sooner and I have a little
2	bit more than five RSVPs come in, I can talk to the
3	hotel; see what we have available. It's just us and
