Hello Andy Olander and the Wisconsin Elks Association — National Foundation Scholarship Committee:

As I was writing college essays and thank you letters, I often equated scholarships to a springboard of opportunities and success. After jumping on these springboards quite aggressively throughout high school and college, I found myself feeling airbound because school has certainly flown by and I have seen so much in 3.5 years. I am currently 5/6 of an engineer, just starting my second to last trimester at Milwaukee School of Engineering (MSOE). So thank you for your generosity. Thank you for seeing a spark of potential in me when you selected me for this scholarship. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to have a transformative college experience that has been challenging and growing in technical knowledge as well as personal and professional development.

My hard work studying mechanical engineering, working internships, and being involved in organizations at MSOE showed to pay off three days after our Fall 2019 career fair on a Monday. I had six companies contact me that day to set up interviews by the end of that week. I was most impressed with Milwaukee Tool because they had reached out to me the day I returned to the United States after my internship in Guatemala to take me out for lunch. The manager I met said he was so impressed with me, he wanted me to skip the on-campus interview and bring me straight to on-site interviews. After he had a battle with HR, the manager said I could not skip this interview since I had not been an intern previously. A week after my on-campus interview, I was invited to their 1.5 day long on-site interview. A few days after I accepted this interview, I received a call from the VP of engineering at Milwaukee Tool who offered me the job BEFORE the on-site interview. The VP had asked the two managers that interviewed me on campus, "Who can we not afford to lose?" My name was the only one brought up.

The VP of Engineering gave me one week to make a decision. I was already balancing four other offers in mid-October, which is quite early in the job hunt season, and a number of other companies I interviewed with said they could not get back to me by the expiration of my Milwaukee Tool job offer. I still participated in the 1.5 day interview with Milwaukee Tool to get to know the company better and make the best decision for myself. There were nearly 200 potential new-hires from all over the US, including MIT, Purdue, Cornell, Rose Holman, and University of California-Berkeley. It was intimidating place to be, and I was shocked when the VP told me I was the only person in that room with an offer currently standing. After a lot of pro/con lists and praying, I decided to accept the fantastic offer from Milwaukee Tool, and I will be working in Lighting and Lifestyle which is one of the very diverse departments, designing things from heated jackets to vacuum cleaners to hard hats.

My senior design project has been challenging but enjoyable. Argonne National Lab (ANL) and my team of mechanical engineering students at MSOE have partnered in the development of an acoustic levitator. An acoustic levitator utilizes standing waves to suspend a solution for precision measurement without interference from a container. Acoustic levitation was originally developed to simulate microgravity conditions for NASA in 1979, but Argonne National Laboratory has been using acoustic levitation to improve the process of developing pharmaceutical drugs that are more effective with fewer side effects. Levitation or "container-less processing" is useful for the study of nucleation, supercooling, the transformation of a substance into a non-crystalline amorphous solid, also known as vitrification. It can also be used in the synthesis of new materials. Our team is studying particle instability during levitation by creating a tool for the study of the effects of various inputs such as variation in temperature, humidity, medium, and frame alignment on the reduction of particle jitter. We're working to create a device that incorporates an automatic alignment system for repeatability and optimization, in addition to a pressure chamber for experimentation with alternative levitating mediums.

On campus and outside of the classroom, I have been involved in Society of Women Engineers (SWE), InterVarsity Christian Fellowship (IVCF), and Engineers without Borders (EWB). In SWE, I have loved encouraging and motivating other female engineering students. I have been given a lot of opportunities to teach younger girls about STEM and participate on speaker panels with Female Leaders Advocating for Mechanical Engineers (FLAME) and American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME). As President of IVCF, I have had an amazing opportunity to mentor our members and leaders in both group and one-on-one settings. It is challenging and so rewarding to help develop people into effective, confident leaders. I have been embracing the concept of building people up to take over what I've been doing so they can make the role their own and have even greater success and opportunities than I had myself. I have grown and refined my love and skills for public speaking, and I have had opportunities to plan and lead a number of workshops as well as write and deliver several sermons.

Engineers without Borders continues to be one of my proudest accomplishments. After helping design and build two bridges and a schoolhouse in Guatemala, I wanted an integral design role related to my major. Therefore, I started the very first, solely mechanical engineering EWB project in Guatemala with EWB-MSOE in Fall 2017. EWB-MSOE and EWB-USA/Guatemala have been partnering with Heifer International to decrease wood consumption in cardamom spice dryers. Guatemala is the largest producer and exporter of cardamom in the world, and deforestation is a large environmental and economic concern for Guatemala and its dryer operators. It is estimated that over 300,000 m³ of wood are used annually, which equates to approximately 30 km² of deforestation on a yearly basis.

After analysis of different components of the dryer system, the MSOE-EWB team has been retrofitting the spice dryer's heat exchanger (HX). It has been a challenging and long process with a number of failed concepts and designs, but we recently discovered a very simple, cost effective solution that we call "swirlers." These small metal inserts in the HX pipes mix up the insulating boundary layer for better heat exchange and a more uniform airstream. It is adapted from a similar concept called twisted tape commonly used in HX industry but costs ~\$1 per an entire drying system for materials. My team has been performing studies on a small-scale experiment in Milwaukee to optimize their design, and we have had three teams travel to Guatemala for assessment and implementation trips. We learned from our implementation of swirlers in March 2019 that the dryer with swirlers reduced wood consumption from 4 m³ to 3 m³ (a massive 25% decrease) and cut drying time from 36 hours to 32 hours (11% decrease).

Because of these promising results in the cardamom industry, I continued my research on cardamom spice dryers as an intern at the EWB-USA office in Guatemala for three months in 2019. My work focused mostly on Heifer International's new prototype. I designed and installed a heat exchanger, structural supports, and instrumentation for the prototype as well as wrote test procedures and executed experiments/analysis to establish the operating parameters of the dryer. I had some amazing opportunities to explore the country more and add more crazy stories to my repertoire, including being surrounded by a pack of seven dogs and fighting myself away with a bible and a water bottle and also climbing a volcano with a parasite and three bacterial infections.

Because of the momentum this project has been gaining, I submitted an abstract of my research and work on cardamom drying and had the opportunity to present at the national EWB conference in November 2019 in Pittsburg. I have been working with the director of EWB-USA/Guatemala to start building up mechanical engineering sectors within EWB chapters at different schools, and I have been invited to present all around Wisconsin to different EWB chapters. The team's professional mentors from the USA and Guatemala have helped guide our project. The partnerships and connections have been fantastic, and this entire project has taught our mechanical engineering students a lot professionally and technically.

Our third team of students and myself just returned in late November 2019 from traveling to a remote area in Guatemala with countless cardamom farmers. The team got to learn from the farmers while participating in the dissipation of this simple and effective improvement to their cardamom dryers. We also met with Heifer International who had a 10 year-plan to replace the 6,000 old dryers with a completely new dryer beginning summer 2020. After my presentation to the Guatemalan director of Heifer International, he decided to change their entire 10-year business plan to validate and utilize our technology of swirlers on a large scale due to the effectiveness for a fraction of the cost of a complete replacement. Heifer International also wants to define a road map of new innovations of each segment of the dryer system for the next 3 years with MSOE. As a project manager, it is quite exemplary to see what my pioneering team of MSOE students has undertaken, the persistence we've demonstrated to see it through, and our willingness to more fully understand the development process and wrestle with the reality of appropriate technology.

Again, thank you. I am so humbled and grateful for these stories, experiences, and opportunities. I could not have accomplished this without your support. God Bless!
